R.T. Fisher Alternative—Applause for Teachers

R.T. Fisher Alternative School (RTF) recognizes Jessica Noll as RTF's Teacher of the Year for the 2016-2017 school year. Ms. Noll has been at RTF for five years and is the elementary teacher for the BLAST program. She is a special education teacher who works with students with behavior difficulties. The main goals for students who are in the RTF BLAST program are to learn self-control and how to use coping strategies that they can take into many areas of their lives.

While at RTF, Ms. Noll's students learn life skills to deal with daily stressors. The purpose of this new learning is for students to internalize the skills and be able to apply them when they return to their home schools. Once students are able to appropriately use these approaches to life issues, they are able to gain more learning time and make academic progress.

Another proven practice facilitated within Ms. Noll's classroom is differentiation in instruction. She ensures that each student's learning style is met through a variety of strategies that address visual, auditory, and kinesthetic needs. "Our students get creative with spelling words and reading stories as well as solving math problems," says Ms. Noll. She finds that students who are able to have fun with learning are more engaged in understanding concepts and retaining the information.



Ms. Noll believes that yearly SCS training for special education teachers helps her be a more effective teacher. "There are a lot of different opportunities for professional learning each year. Some of those are AIMSweb and data usage, BLAST/WWT programs, EasyIEP/EdPlan, reading and math interventions, and classroom management. The trainings are specific to students with special needs, but may be applied as necessary with any student and learning environment." A primary implementation from these trainings that Ms. Noll uses is the review of AIMSweb data to determine and support present levels of student performance and to help drive appropriate goals for students who are on individualized education plans. AIMSweb assessments are performed to expedite interventions and academic success for students as they re-enter their home schools.

R. Ellis Middle—Integrating Academics and the Arts

Robert E. Ellis Middle School (EMS) faculty has a prioritized goal to comprehensively integrate academic content areas and the arts. This goal is set to illustrate the importance of each content area and how each contributes to success later in life. Several successful EMS events were accomplished during the first semester of the 2016-17 school year to provide students the opportunity to experience firsthand this comprehensive integration. A few examples are below:

<u>Veterans Day Program</u>—Last semester, EMS hosted a Veterans Day program for Hendersonville and the surrounding communities. Veterans from various counties and states attended. The program was developed through collaboration among the social studies, visual arts, and music classes at EMS. The program contained a number of musical performances, art displays, and ceremonial activities lead by the EMS Student Council. The goals for this event were for students to develop a deep sense of appreciation of veterans, to showcase student talent, and to demonstrate to veterans the honor that they deserve. Here is an email providing feedback for and a photo of the event:

Mr. Cripps,

"I feel compelled to email you and express how in awe I am of the Veterans Day program you and the others put on today. This wasn't your typical "Let's have the band and chorus sing a few tunes, say the Pledge of Allegiance, and thank the veterans for their service" type of program . . . which would have been lovely. On the contrary, this was a heartfelt, well thought out, and expertly executed tribute that one could barely expect at the collegiate level let alone from a middle school in little ol' Hendersonville, TN. From having all musical ensembles, not only playing individually but together WITH narration (sorry about the mic mishap), color guard, keynote speaker, the delicate presentation of the "missing" table, and on and on. This shows not only a dedication to veterans, but it demonstrates an overall climate and culture at Ellis that is not seen in many schools today."



<u>Cross Content Integration with the Visual Arts</u>—EMS seventh graders learned about Tennessee's various state symbols by creating unique works of art. Each student used colored pencil techniques to create either the state bird or a bird that is common in Tennessee. Students also created printing stamps by carving a floral design onto Styrofoam. The floral designs were either the state flower or a wildflower. The birds and printed flowers were put onto maps of Tennessee. EMS teachers tied social studies and art together in another seventh grade project as well. The focus was folklore and mythology of the Middle Ages. After learning about dragons and what they represented during the Middle Ages, students created their own dragon eye by drawing with colored pencil techniques. Station Camp Middle—Teamwork brings Results

At Station Camp Middle School (SCM), teachers are always looking for the best way to use assessment to drive instruction. This year, the eighth grade math teachers share how they use student data to make informed decisions that lead to effective outcomes.

Math teacher, Leah Tomlinson, explains:

Our eighth grade math department meets weekly to plan. We use data from our mid-term exams to focus our daily math on topics where the students showed need. We use weekly tasks to review students on systems of equations as this continues to be a common student weakness. We plan together what lessons we will teach, and we collaborate to create and/or share resources to support the curriculum. We give students a teacher-created pre-test and posttest for each math unit. The data collected from the pre-test is used to guide instruction and to show students the areas on which they need to concentrate their studying. The post-test data shows growth and reveals any remaining weaknesses.

We let the students use the scores to measure their own academic growth. We celebrate growth in the math standard more than focusing on the assessment grade. The students enjoy charting their learning growth and identifying the correction process for any mistakes that they made. This has resulted in a deeper level of ownership for the students, a deeper level of understanding of the material, and higher test averages overall. Students take home the pre-tests on the day they are taken and are allowed to keep it for a study guide for the post-test. This practice helps to alleviate the "unknown" factor of the test regarding number of and type of questions. We believe this approach is helping us become better teachers as we really lean into and unpack the standard to plan our instruction. This process is hard work, but the level of ownership and mastery is worth every minute that we spend in preparation.

Mrs. Tomlinson appreciates the collaboration with her planning team, Mrs. Clark and Mrs. Spence. She says, "They are AMAZING to work with, and I feel honored to be alongside them in the journey." SCM shares that this is only one example of the great work that is occurring with all its teachers and in all its classes!



Westmoreland Middle—Junior Beta Club Academic Convention

Westmoreland Middle School (WMS) Junior Beta Club had 47 members attend the 26th annual Tennessee State Junior Beta Club Academic Convention. The convention was held at the Opryland Hotel and Convention Center in Nashville, Tennessee. This marked the 19th year for WMS to be represented at the state meeting. Accompanying the students were 31 chaperones including parents, teachers, guests, and club sponsors. The students and adults were part of the 7600-plus attendees from 186 Tennessee clubs at this year's convention.

WMS had another successful year at the convention in a variety of competitions. The club captured four awards including second place in *Spotlight Your Club*, fifth place in *Scrapbook*, fourth place in *Banner Design*, and fifth place in *Handmade Wreath*. WMS Junior Beta Club was also honored with the *Gold Key Club Award* and named a School of Distinction with the National Beta Club organization.

Junior Beta Club members participated in a variety of academic and creative competitions. WMS student teams took part in *Quiz Bowl*, *Book Battle*, and *Visual Design*. Individual students participated in language arts, math, poetry, science, and social studies events. Reagan Hill finished in the top ten for the language arts category.

"Westmoreland Middle School is always well represented at the state convention," stated Dr. Tim Copeland, the club's sponsor. He added, "In our second year, we placed third in the *Tennessee History* competition. Over the past 19



years we've continued to place in a variety of competitions especially in *Living Literature* and *Scrapbook*. We hope to continue our success on the national competition level as we have the past three years."

Students attended three general sessions during the convention. Session one consisted of introductions of national and state officers and officials. All candidates running for a state office were required to give a campaign speech and perform a skit, similar to a commercial, that would help students remember the candidate when it was time to vote. The second session was devoted to special talent and guest entertainers, "Voices of Lee." The final session was an award ceremony and the announcement and installation of the newly-elected state officers. WMS Junior Beta Club members represented the school well and enjoyed themselves while doing it!

In the most recently-documented TCAP data, Portland Gateview Elementary School (PGE) placed sixth in Tennessee for growth in math and had a 9.2% growth rate for R/LA. PGE also earned a Level Five in TVAAS in the following areas: literacy, numeracy, literacy and numeracy, science, and composite. To continue this excellent progress, PGE holds high expectations for its students and makes teaching and learning visible. The teachers participate in collaborative planning, peer observations, modeled lessons, focused walkthroughs, lesson studies, and a demonstration classroom. Working to have a growth mindset, teachers focus on seeing learning through the eyes of students. PGE believes that allowing students to track their achievement helps them determine and understand progress and goals.
